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CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Welcome.

Hello, Everyone. Thank you. I'd like to welcome all of you today to the May 2nd Program Services Committee meeting, and I'd like to issue a special welcome to our newest member of the committee, Diana Ragbeer, who, for many of you, or shall I say most of you, or all of you, is a very familiar face.

Diana served 14 years as director of public policy and communications, and later community engagement here at the Trust. And she's a well known advocate, not only statewide, but here in the Miami community. She did a brief stint with the Early Learning Coalition after leaving the Trust and is now doing great work all around the State.

She has been appointed -- she's an appointed member of the Florida Governor's Children and Youth Cabinet and a member of the Florida KidCare Board operational efficiency previously.

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Well, then we're going to stop there and pass the mike briefly to Diana, if you'd like to say a few words. We're so happy to have you. Welcome.

COMMITTEE MEMBER RAGBEER: Thank you so much. It feels good to be home. think I said that at the last Board meeting, but really to see the great work that's continuing to evolve and some of my dream items come to fruition. At the last Board meeting, the pool safety item passed. And as many of you know, I was really behind that for many years, wanting to see that. The \$3 million for Families Forward scholarships, that's moved forward, and The Moving Beyond Depression for women suffering from postpartum depression. That was something that was very, very strongly in support of. So it was heartwarming to see that the items today are great. It's just wonderful to see all the good work that you all are continuing to do and move the ball forward, so I feel good to be home. Thank you.

over to Bevone. She'll be presenting the first four resolutions. It's a brief PowerPoint. We're going to have a more extensive PowerPoint at the full board So I'd like to turn over to meeting. Bevone Ritchie, who leads us in our family

> MS. RITCHIE: Good afternoon, Everyone. As Jim mentioned, there are four resolutions before you in this space, and we collectively call them family services or family support services. They are -- next slide. They are resolutions A, B, C and D. These are collectively initiatives that support -- thank you, These are collectively initiatives Jack. that support parents, caregivers, with research and evidence-based strategies to help them achieve their goals. Thank you.

> So the first one is Parenting and Family Strengthening. It will be Resolution A; Family Neighborhood Support Partnerships, Resolution B; Health Public Benefits Enrollment, Resolution C, and the 211 Helpline, which is Resolution D.

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Next slide.

Again, I'm going to start with A, parenting and family strengthening programs.

Next. Okay. So we support -- at the Children's Trust, we offer parenting programs that support family along a continuum of care, right? So they range from the universally available to supporting populations that are more indicated, right? And if you see the universal is greyed out, these are like our onetime workshops. We are currently in the process. We have an open RFP, and we will be bringing recommendations to the July Board meeting for your approval, so we will not be discussing that today.

What we will be discussing in the Parenting and Family Strengthening is our selective and indicating programs, which are evidence-based or research informed programming that engage families, either in a group format or individually, and we provide parenting education. And these are typically families that need a little

bit more work, or support, if you will, so we offer these group based series, and they range from five to upwards of 25 sessions depending on the model. So they include home visitation programs and/or group and individual programs.

And then we also offer more clinical services. These are indicated programs, and we have some of our home visitation programs that offer indicated programs. They're different models. And then we have our behavioral health programs that support the indicated population.

We, at the Children's Trust, hope that our community sees us as a place to come and get parenting program. We want to be a source to support families with this. We believe the cliche that children don't come with instructions, and they want to offer caregivers an array of services to meet their needs.

Next.

So within the resolution, you'll see, this is the first year of funding, of the funding cycle, and we're only at the

six-month mark, so they began in October of last year and they -- the data that we're presenting here takes you to March 2024. So we do have 45 programs that we contract with for \$23.3 million and, to date, we've served 3,741 families, and within those programs, 6,866 children have also been served.

Next.

The next initiative that I'm going to speak to is the Family and Neighborhood Support Partnerships or FNSP for short, and this is resolution B.

Next. So I just want to highlight a little bit about the design. We are also in the new funding cycle for this, but for this program, we are in year two, so, to date, we're about a year and a half into programming. And when we redesigned this program, we thought it was really important to take a strength-based approach to providing what are called care coordination support for families that have multiple needs and they need support to navigate the system, right? So we

provide care coordination wraparound services, and we do that in conjunction with what are called success coaches, right? So these are individuals that -- and, again, success coach, somebody says, well, what does that mean? These are individuals that support care coordination, and we wanted to sort of play on the strength-based approach and address sort of the outcomes we expect. So that's why we named them success coach.

And we also thought it was important to include natural helpers, right? these are individuals that might have gone through similar circumstances that you were -- the participants might have been experiencing. And they provide sort of these navigation supports. Thev understand where you're coming from and they can provide a different level support. So the program works with a common assessment tool. The CANS assessment. And what families do is, they work on their goals and they do so in conjunction with a success coach and they

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develop success plans.

We have a standard operating procedure, and these families are supported by emergency funding in the tune of -- we have 500,000 annually available, so that they can access them for emergency things, such as housing, if their light bill is disconnected and those sorts of things.

Okay, next.

So just a little bit of data. As I indicated, we're in year two, the first six months of that. And if you could see, service delivery has ramped up significantly from the first year. The second -- what we did during year one, is we did a lot of training because, we had this common system. We had a new way of doing it. So programs are well into the cycle, and you see, in the second year, the new funding cycle, the numbers served in the first six months of year two have surpassed or nearly reached the numbers served in year one. See that for families and for the children and youth served.

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Next.

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The third resolution is Health Public Benefits Enrollment. Resolution C. next. So we have nine provider agency, and this initiative is in year one of the five-year funding cycle operating on the first six months, so from October 23rd to March 24th. We have nine agencies that provide services to 3,948 participants to date. Each of them have a contracted number of families to serve, so you see the different number. That means that in the 2017 families, there are multiple individuals within the families receiving benefits.

So we have a rate of 82 percent successful enrollment and we add a value to those benefits. So the total benefits. the value added to that is, \$313,282.00. And of all the benefits access, 3,285 were approved.

Next.

And the last resolution that I'm giving you the highlights to is our 211 Helpline operated by Jewish Community

Services. Next. Resolution D. So this
is our help line where we have trained
counsellors that use both online and/or
phone directory. They have -- as an

individual, you have access to calling and getting information and referrals to

services within Miami-Dade County.

So within the 211 Helpline resource directory, there are 4,462 -- 63 community resources that are available and a 100 -- 1,152 agencies provide those resources, right? There are -- as you could see the searches that were done, online searches, over 91,000 and individual calls were 49,000 plus, right?

One of the things I did want to highlight, the number that represents enhanced advocacy calls. What we learn through working with the providers and looking at the data was that a lot of families were or individuals that were calling were coming with more complex needs, right? So they had multiple needs. They were going through a lot. And we contract for enhanced advocacy. These are

like warm handoffs to the resources that 1 are provided. So we, through the contract 2 -- and this is last year's data for '22 --3 22-23, there were 4,200 enhanced advocacy 4 calls through 211. 5 So that represents the detail to help 6 7 you review and approve Resolutions A 8 through D. Thank you. CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank 9 you, Bevone. 10 Any questions from committee members? 11 12 All right let's move now to resolutions. 13 And for the first resolution I'm 14 going to punt to Lourdes, who's going to 15 16 walk us through. 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Reach out and Read, ROR, is a national model endorsed by the American Academy of Pediatrics that champions the positive effects of reading daily and engaging in language rich activities with young children within positive parent child interactions. The program trains medical providers on the importance of early relationships as the foundation for healthy brain development, leading to the emergence of early language, literacy and social, emotional skills and provides books for families. Miami-Dade Family Learning Partnership holds exclusive distributor rights for the ROR program in Florida.

The National Research Out and Read Center awards this distinction. ROR is an essential component of the Children's Trust early literacy parenting support and it offers a unique opportunity to encourage early relationships and literacy through trusted pediatric care providers.

Moving now to discussion with a brief Since 1965, the federal Head Start note. program has provided comprehensive early education and support services to three and four-year old children living in families earning below the FPL. recognition of the importance of the early years of children development, the Early Head Start program was established in 1994. In 2024, the Federal Government made \$100 million available to expand Early Head Start services nationally, and these funds will be awarded competitively to grantees nationwide.

This authorization will award the Miami-Dade County community action and human services department an additional \$400,000.00 in local match funds for an additional 260 high quality Early Head Start learning slots in the event that federal funding is awarded inside of this new federal grant opportunity. The Trust additional match will help drawdown

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approximately \$5 million in new federal 1 funds, if awarded. 2 Feedback? Discussion from the 3 committee? 4 COMMITTEE MEMBER DIAZ: Matched 5 funds. This is an expansion grant to the 6 7 current. So they're reapplying 8 (Inaudible). CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: 9 Thank 10 you. Further questions? Hearing none, all those in favor? 11 12 COLLECTIVELY: Aye. CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there 13 14 any opposed? The resolution carries. Resolution 2024G. "Authorization to 15 execute a funder collaboration contract 16 with the U.S. Soccer Foundation to support 17 the continuation of the Soccer for Success 18 19 program and the expansion of the Just Ball 20 program, in a total amount not to exceed 21 \$300,000.00, for a term of 12 months, commencing August 1, 2024, and ending 22 23 September 30, 2025. 24 May I have a motion, please? They'll be 13 14 utilizing some of the mini pitches but the mini pitches, the other guys will bring 15 16 separately. 17 Natalia, is this directly associated with that? 18 MS. ZEA: The Children's Trust 19 20 investment is not towards the mini pitches 21 in any way. That was by Griffin Catalyst. Our investment is specifically for 22 23 programming and some of the staffing 24 that's needed to execute programming. 25 COMMITTEE MEMBER DUNN: Okav.

1 Because our site was being looked at. It's nothing concrete now, but it's being 2 looked at as a possible site, so that's 3 why I wanted to put that on record, if I 4 needed to recuse myself or not. 5 MS. ZEA: I think not. 6 7 COMMITTEE MEMBER DUNN: No? Okay. CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: 8 Thank 9 you, Pastor. So with no more recusals, moving to discussion. 10 The selection of Miami-Dade County as 11 12 a host site for the 2026 -- is it FIFA or FIFA? I'm showing my soccer ignorance. 13 14 FIFA world cup, presents a unique 15 opportunity to expand upon the 16 longstanding partnership between the U.S. Soccer Foundation and the Children's Trust 17 18 through its Miami-Dade soccer initiative. 19 The initiative intends to create a 20 long-term legacy of soccer in the 21 community also giving youths from underresourced and underserved communities 22 safe places to play and effective and 23 24 relevant programming.

And you'll see on the info graphic in

your packet that between fall 2023 and spring 2024, more than 5,000 children were engaged, and more than 99% of the initiatives 75 plus coaches say that the foundation led training increased their ability to help address the social, emotional or health needs of youths.

Our key note speaker was President Pumariega, and just a standing room crowd with over 400 participants, a really good feedback about where the Trust's at, how we're responding community needs and how we're working with the providers. So I want to thank the team who worked very hard to get this -- to put this together.

Thank you, Madam Chair.
