COMMITTEE MEMBER GIMENEZ: Thank you.

Resolution 2024-A: Requesting authorization to negotiate and execute contracts with the Early Learning Coalition of Miami-Dade/Monroe, Miami-Dade County Community Action and Human Services Department, and the United Way of Miami-Dade, for local match funding for the federal Early Head Start-Child Care Partnership grant, in a total amount not to exceed \$2,270,000.00, for a term of 12 months, commencing October 1, 2024, and ending September 30, 2025.

Do I have a motion to approve?

MS. KOBRINSKY: Sorry. Juana, do you have a copy of the bylaws? I just -- we don't -- okay, now we have three. Sorry.

We only had two members who are

potentially voting, so we can just skip 1 that one, but we have another member who 2 just showed up, so I think we're all set. 3 COMMITTEE MEMBER GIMENEZ: Motion to 4 -- do I have to read again the resolution? 5 MS. KOBRINSKY: No, we're on reso 6 2024-A. 7 COMMITTEE MEMBER ABRAHAM: 8 So moves. COMMITTEE MEMBER GIMENEZ: Do I have 9 10 a second? COMMITTEE MEMBER ADEBISI: Second. 11 Are there 12 COMMITTEE MEMBER GIMENEZ: any recusals? 13 COMMITTEE MEMBER FERRADA7: Gilda 14 Ferradaz, I serve on the Early Coalition 15 16 board. CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Recused, 17 18 Hollingsworth. I work for the Early 19 Learning Coalition. COMMITTEE MEMBER GIMENEZ: Since 20 21 1965, the federal Head Start program has 22 provided public assistance with early education and support services for 23 3-and-4-year-old children living in 24 25 families earning below the federal poverty

level. In recognition of the importance 1 of the earliest years in children's 2 development, the Early Head Start program 3 was established in 1994 to serve children 4 from birth to three years of age. 5 In, 2014, the Federal Government made 6 7 \$650 million available to expand the DHS 8 services nationally. These funds were awarded competitively to grant kids 9 10 nationwide to expand access, provide quality comprehensive services for infants 11 12 and toddlers living in families earning below the federal poverty level. 13 14 Is there any discussion on the item, 15 feedback or questions? 16 MR. HAJ: Chair, if I may just point out for reso A, B and D, and this is where 17 18 we leverage our money to drawdown funds, 19 so our \$6.3 million helps drawdown 28 million from federal and state to 20 21 Miami-Dade. COMMITTEE MEMBER GIMENEZ: 22 Hearing no feedback or questions, all those in favor? 23 COLLECTIVELY: Aye. 24 COMMITTEE MEMBER GIMENEZ: 25 Anv

COMMITTEE MEMBER GIMENEZ:

Background. The School Readiness program match is a public/private partnership that helps employers meet the needs of working parents. Through this program, federal and state funding is matched with contributions from local governments, charitable foundations and participating businesses on a dollar for dollar basis to improve child care services for participating families.

The Children's Trust provides this local match funding according to the terms and conditions set forth to assist the ELC in drawing down the maximum funding from state's SRPM child care subsidy program, formally known as child care executive partnership.

The Children's Trust contributed a dollar for dollar match during the past 14 contract periods. This match supports child care services for more than 375 children, child care programs

1 participating in SRPM are located throughout Miami-Dade County. All slots 2 are being fully utilized. 3 Is there any discussion, feedback or 4 questions from the members? 5 Hearing no further discussion, all 6 7 those in favor? COLLECTIVELY: Aye. 8 COMMITTEE MEMBER GIMENEZ: 9 Any Resolution carries. Thank you. 10 opposed? CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank 11 12 you, Lourdes. Resolution 2024-C: Authorization to 13 14 negotiate and execute contract renewals 15 with six providers identified herein for 16 Early Childhood community research demonstration projects within high-need 17 18 communities, in a total amount not to 19 exceed \$1,939,358, for a term of 20 12 months, commencing October 1, 2024, and 21 ending September 30, 2025, with one 22 remaining contract renewal. May I have a motion, please? 23 COMMITTEE MEMBER GIMENEZ: So moved. 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: 25 Thank

1 you. And a second? 2 COMMITTEE MEMBER FERRADAZ: 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: 4 second. 5 Are there any recusals? Hearing 6 7 none, moving then to discussion. 8 Committee Members, as indicated in 9 the description of services, the Early Childhood community research demonstration 10 11 project support early childhood 12 development by implementing and evaluating programs involving high-need populations 13 and underserved communities in Miami-Dade 14 15 County. 16 These projects require active partnerships between community-based early 17 18 childhood organizations and qualified 19 research partners. Funding is invested 20 only in high quality program 21 implementation and rigorous program evaluation or research that can contribute 22

1 Each program of the six that you are considering today is performing 2 satisfactorily and meeting all contract 3 deliverables. The agencies are all 4 engaged with THEIR community partners and 5 have recruited the appropriate number of 6 7 participants. Activities are being delivered as contracted and research 8 9 projects are well underway. And I'd invite you to take a look at 10 the table in your packet to see an 11 12 overview of the aggregate numbers of participants served across all projects 13 14 during the 2022/2023 contract year. Feedback, discussion, comments from 15 the committee? 16 17 Hearing none, all those in favor? 18 COLLECTIVELY: Ave. CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there 19 any opposed? The resolution carries. 20 21 Resolution 2024-D. RCMA -- oops. pardon me. I'm reading the wrong one. 22 Authorization to negotiate and 23 24 execute a contract with Redlands Christian 25 Migrant Association, RCMA, for a local

1 match funding to drawdown federal/state funds to subsidize early child care in a 2 total amount not to exceed \$102,000, for a 3 term of 12 months, commencing October 1, 4 2024, and ending September 30, 2025. 5 May I have a motion, please? 6 7 COMMITTEE MEMBER ADEBISI: 8 (Inaudible). CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank 9 10 you. And a second? 11 12 COMMITTEE MEMBER ABRAHAM: Second. CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there 13 14 any recusals? Okay, with no recusals, let's move now to discussion. 15 16 RCMA, which was founded in 1965, is a nonprofit, nonsectarian organization 17 18 funded through public and private sources. 19 RCMA provides high quality child care and early education for children of migrant 20 21 and seasonal farm workers and low income 22 families living in rural areas throughout 23 Florida. RCMA serves nearly 6500 children 24 in more than 66 centers in 21 counties, 25 with more than 450 children on the waiting

1 list statewide. RCMA and Miami-Dade County needs a 2 total fiscal match of \$228,000. 3 Miami-Dade County provides 118 of that. 4 The Children's Trust is recommended to 5 offer an annual match of 102,000. 6 7 And in order to leverage the full 8 amount needed, RCMA secures the additional 8,000 from other sources. 9 10 Discussion, feedback from the Committee? 11 12 COMMITTEE MEMBER DUNN: Madam Chair, while it may not be any relation to this 13 14 particular reso, anytime I see the word 15 Redlands, my heart goes out for Jimmy 16 Rice, yes, ma'am. And so I'm all in, whatever we can do in that area. I know 17 18 it may not have any connectivity, but when 19 I see Redlands, I think about Jimmy Rice 20 all the time and his family. CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: 21 Thank you, Reverend Dunn. 22 Further feedback of the Committee? 23 24 Hearing none, all those in favor? 25 COLLECTIVELY: Ave.

CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there 1 any opposed? The resolution carries. 2 Resolution 2024-E: Authorization to 3 negotiate and execute a contract with the 4 University of Miami Nova Southeastern 5 University (UM-NSU) Center for Autism and 6 7 Related Disabilities (CARD) for autism 8 spectrum disorders (ASD) diagnostic evaluation services, in a total amount not 9 10 to exceed \$264,000.00, for a term of 12 months, commencing October 1, 2024, and 11 12 ending September 30, 2025. May I have a motion, please? 13 COMMITTEE MEMBER DUNN: So moved, 14 Richard Dunn. 15 COMMITTEE MEMBER GIMENEZ: 16 Second, Gimenez. 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: 18 Thank 19 you. 20 Are there any recusals? Hearing no 21 recusals, moving to discussion. 22 This funding supports comprehensive psychoeducational diagnostic evaluation 23 24 services for children ages 2 through 5, 25 and it's provided by UM NSU CARD at a

reduced unit cost. Evaluation services 1 and the components that are listed here in 2 3 the current diagnostic and statistical manual of mental disorders and best 4 practices and ASD assessment. 5 During the 2022/2023 contract year, 6 7 110 children were referred, with 77 assessed and those assessments resulted in 8 9 64 ASD diagnoses. Feedback, discussion from the 10 Committee? 11 12 Reverend Dunn. COMMITTEE MEMBER DUNN: Madam Chair, 13 14 again, this is dear to me on several 15 fronts, as I've aforementioned in the 16 past. As a grandfather, I can relate. As a cousin appeal, A, I can relate. 17 18 an educator, I can relate. So I'm all in 19 for anything we can do to assist in the 20 area of autism and related disabilities, 21 but for the grace of God, there go all of 22 us. CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank 23 24 you, Reverend.

Further discussion from the

1 Committee? Hearing none, all those in favor? 2 COLLECTIVELY: Aye. 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there 4 any opposed? Resolution carries. 5 Resolution 2024-F: Authorization to 6 7 negotiate and execute a contract renewal 8 with the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine U.M., in an amount not to 9 10 exceed \$1,500,000 for comprehensive early intervention for comprehensive early 11 12 intervention services for children with mild developmental delays, who do not meet 13 14 eligibility requirements for the Individuals with Disabilities Education 15 16 Act, IDEA, parts B or C, for a term of 12 months, commencing October 1, 2024, and 17 18 ending September 30, 2025. 19 May I have a motion, please? COMMITTEE MEMBER GIMENEZ: So moved. 20 Gimenez. 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank 22 23 you. 24 And a second? 25 COMMITTEE MEMBER FERRADAZ: Second,

Ferradaz.

CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank
you.

Are there any recusals? Then we move to discussion.

The early discovery program provided by U.M. serves young children exhibiting mild developmental delays that are not severe enough to meet the state eligibility requirement for the IDEA early intervention services. However, such children need and will benefit from early intervention services. Early discovery offers short-term speech and language therapy, occupational therapy and/or behavioral and developmental interventions based on identified needs in the area of concern.

For the 2022/23 year, just an overview of some child outcome improvements: Speech and language improvement at 84%; social and emotional development at 70%; growth and fine motor skills at 86% and overall development at 75%.

Feedback? Questions? 1 COMMITTEE MEMBER ABRAHAM: How many 2 children are involved in this program last 3 4 year? CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: 413, I 5 believe. 6 7 Is that correct, staff? COMMITTEE MEMBER ABRAHAM: And it's 8 9 anticipated about the same number this 10 year? MS. SPECTOR: I believe, when they're 11 12 contracted, they're contracted for 420, so they're almost meeting their numbers, 13 14 yeah. CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: 15 Thank 16 you. 17 Lourdes. 18 COMMITTEE MEMBER GIMENEZ: Just a 19 comment, that I believe it's a very 20 important for early childhood, and you 21 don't need the qualifications for the disabilities education. This is a 22 23 wonderful way to be proactive. And many 24 times you can early intervention at this 25 level, mild. You can get really going

with that child to get him out of maybe coming into the disabilities program.

So I think, you know, this is a wonderful opportunity for these kids that have that mild -- they start with symptoms already where we're dealing with them immediately. We're not letting them get worse and worse. It's just like, you know, you get sick. And if you don't get the medication you need, you're going to get sicker and sicker as we go along, so it's the same thing.

So I'm really glad that we are supporting this program, because it's important for our children. And it's going to be, at the end of it all, you know, helping have less children with more problems in later stages of their childhood development.

COMMITTEE MEMBER ABRAHAM: So I think that's very well said. I was just wondering, just for our information, maybe for all of us, how are children identified for this program? Because I would think that there would be, you know, quite a few

children eligible for it as well. 1 MS. SPECTOR: The children first go 2 3 through the state evaluation system. if they're birth to three, they go through 4 the early steps program or the FDLRS 5 school district assessment program. 6 7 they're going through the channels to see 8 if they qualify for state funded services. 9 When they don't qualify, there's an automatic referral to this program. 10 COMMITTEE MEMBER ABRAHAM: So I was 11 12 just wondering, at first stage, where they're identified to go through the 13 evaluation, that's at the school level or 14 is it some other level? 15 16 MS. SPECTOR: No, it could be --COMMITTEE MEMBER ABRAHAM: 17 I just --18 you know, it's just a question of the funnel. 19 MS. SPECTOR: Yeah. It comes from 20 21 pediatricians, from parents have their own 22 concerns, from priest -- you know, early child care centers, if they're in a 23 24 It could come from anywhere. program. 25 COMMITTEE MEMBER ABRAHAM: Yeah. Ι

would just worry. I mean, it's great program. No problem at all with that.

It's a bigger issue, just the children being identified and, you know, others not being identified, who could benefit from the program.

COMMITTEE MEMBER GIMENEZ: I'd like to add. That's why it's so important early child care centers to have well-trained teachers or assistants that can pick up. And parents, and not because they don't want to see it, it's just they really don't. They're with the child all the time, and they're seeing the same behaviors.

COMMITTEE MEMBER ABRAHAM: Yeah.

COMMITTEE MEMBER GIMENEZ: And it could be the first time they even have a child. And they don't get to determine what is going on with the child, because they wouldn't have a point of comparison.

So having the early centers, you know, the childhood centers and having people that can pick up on these things and refer them, because pediatricians do

refer, but they only see the child one time in their office, maybe every six months at the beginning or whatever.

So, to me, you know -- and I know when I was in prison, I spoke to pediatricians often when they would say, oh, no, the child is with me, and doesn't show any signs of -- you know, the parent is very upset, because they're told that he's doesn't concentrate. I said, "Sir, you have them for how long in your office? We have them the whole day, and the teachers observing these behaviors."

We're not doctors. We can't tell you what's wrong with the child.

So there's a different way of looking at a child from a different perspective:

As a doctor, as a teacher, as a person that, you know, gives them therapy, whether it's LT or PT, or whatever.

There's all different ways. And I think once we have all those ways, we really get the perfect solution for that child.

CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Lourdes.

Reverend Dunn.

COMMITTEE MEMBER DUNN: If I can just piggyback on what just Ms. Gimenez just mentioned. I'm a neophyte on this pretty much, but it does make a difference when it's picked up and treated early, instead of being either overlooked, or ignored or sometimes even possibly some level of denial on the part of the parents, 'cause it's a hard pill, you know, but it's a reality in many cases. And when it's dealt with early, just in my short time in this area, oftentimes you can see a child progress from special aid, if you will, a disability to general population.

And we've seen that, when it's treated and dealt with at an early stage, and it's an exciting thing to see it happen. All you can see is behavior improvement from a child in the classroom where now the child is teachable.

Did I say that right? Okay.

CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Reverend.

Committee Members, thank you for that

1 lively discussion. All those in favor? 2 COLLECTIVELY: Aye. 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there 4 any opposed? The resolution carries. 5 And our final resolution of today, 6 7 Resolution 2024-G: Authorization to waive 8 the formal competitive procurement process and to amend resolution 2023-38 in the 9 current contract with Blossom Group 10 Florida, LLC, for youth development 11 12 services, starting from January 23, 2024, to the end of the contract term, 13 August 14, 2024, in order to add a 14 subcontractor, Los Pinos Nuevos Christian 15 16 Corp., and to provide youth development services to 30 elementary school students, 17 18 rather than high school students. 19 May I have a motion, please? COMMITTEE MEMBER FERRADAZ: Moved. 20 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second? 22 23 COMMITTEE MEMBER ABRAHAM: Second. CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there 24 25 any recusals? Okay.

And moving quickly to discussion, Blossom Group Florida, LLC, was approved through the resolution mentioned earlier, but the important thing is that they were approved to serve high school students in a school year only after school program in two sites in Hialeah, which they operated directly along with enrichment services provided by partner entity junior achievement.

Due to recruitment issues at one of the sites, Blossom Group has identified a new site with a need for after school services for elementary school students in the same area, and with the same enrichment services provider and the new site will serve new students at Los Pinos Nuevos Christian School Corp., with Los Pinos Nuevos Christian Academy, serving as the new subcontractor through the Blossom Group's original contract. And the location in question is ideal to enable the recruitment of 30 students.

So with that, I open the floor for discussion, feedback?

Hearing none, all those in favor? 1 COLLECTIVELY: Aye. 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there 3 any opposed? The resolution carries. 4 And I'm punting back to you, Mr. Haj. 5 MR. HAJ: Thank you. 6 7 Board Members, just a couple of Board retreat is 8 reminders. 9 February 22nd, in the morning, and it will be in this room. And -- I believe it's in 10 this room. Training room? I think we're 11 12 doing it in this room. Board retreat. We'll have the site, but it's 13 February 22nd. 14 Champions for Children, April 11th, 15 16 same location. Doubletree at Hilton. We sent a list of all the winners. The 17 18 subcommittee of this Board met before the 19 holidays. It was a very difficult 20 decision, but decisions were made on 21 Program of the Year, Dave Lawrence Community Advocacy as well as last year 22 was our first ever Youth Award. 23 24 have some great people to be honored, 25 people that are doing amazing work in the

community, and we're expecting a large crowd. And we'll send -- we've already sent saved the date, but we'll be asking more details and sending the invite and parking instructions, which we'll have worked out by then. Madam Chair, thank you. CHAIRPERSON HOLLINGSWORTH: Okay. Thank you, Jim. And with that, Committee Members, we are adjourned. Thank you. (Thereupon, at 3:57 p.m., the meeting was adjourned).
