2	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Good to see everyone.
3	Welcome to our Program Services and Childhood Health
4	Committee Meeting. Good to see so many of you at the
5	table today.
6	Muriel, do we have any public comments?
7	MS. JEANTY: Madam Chair, we don't have any
8	public comments. Thank you.
9	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Okay, thank you very much.
10	Then let's move on to the approval of the minutes from
11	the January 6 meeting, which, that date is resonating,
12	I did not attend in person as it was my birthday. By
13	now you had an opportunity to review the minutes. May
14	I have a motion to approve the minutes as shown in
15	your packet?
16	MS. WELLER: So moved, Karen Weller.
17	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second?
18	MS. NEASMAN: Second, Neasman.
19	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: All those in favor?
20	(WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
21	with "aye.")
22	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Any opposed?
23	(No verbal response.)
24	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: The resolution carries. May
25	I pause here to ask if we have any participants by

1	zoom today?
2	MS. JEANTY: So to get from zoom, if anybody is
3	joining via zoom, mute yourself when you're not
4	talking and raise your hand when you went to talk.
5	That's it.
6	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you very much, Muriel.
7	All right, Committee Members, let's move on to our
8	resolutions. In the first two resolutions I would
9	point out, this is the last renewal year for them.
10	Beginning with Resolution 2022-A: Authorization
11	to negotiate and execute final contract renewals with
12	81 providers identified herein, to deliver high-
13	quality after-school programming for 12,197 elementary
14	school children and summer programming for 13,125
15	elementary school children, in a total amount not to
16	exceed \$36,090,190.00, each for a term of 12 months,
17	commencing August 1, 2022, and ending July 31, 2023,
18	for year-round and school-year programs, subject to
19	annual funding appropriations.
20	May I have a motion, please?
21	MS. DONWORTH: Donworth.
22	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And can I have a second?
23	DR. ABRAHAM: Second, Abraham.
24	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Are there any
25	recusals?

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1	(No verbal response.)
2	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Hearing none, moving to
3	discussion. The floor is open. Questions?
4	Hearing none, all those in favor?
5	(WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
6	with "aye.")
7	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?
8	(No verbal response.)
9	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: The resolution carries.
10	Resolution 2022-B: Authorization to negotiate and
11	execute final contract renewals with 56 providers
12	identified herein, to deliver high-quality after-
13	school programming for 3,798 middle and high school
14	youth and summer programming for 2,492 middle and high
15	school youth, in a total amount not to exceed
16	\$14,283,160.00, each for a term of 12 months,
17	commencing August 1, 2022, and ending July 31, 2023,
18	for year-round and school-year programs, subject to
19	annual funding appropriations.
20	May I have a motion, please?
21	MS. GIMENEZ: So moved, Gimenez.
22	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. And a second?
23	MS. WELLER: Second, Weller.
24	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any recusals?
25	(No verbal response.)

1	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Hearing none, let's move to
2	discussion, please. Observations, questions from the
3	Committee?
4	DR. ABRAHAM: I'd just like to make a comment. I
5	had a discussion with Lori about these. These are
6	very important programs and I just wanted to express
7	my enthusiasm for them. These are signature programs
8	for us. The only question I had for Lori was about
9	the waiting list, you know, because it seemed like
10	given what these programs offer, there would be a lot
11	more children and families involved. And I know it's
12	just a capacity issue.
13	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Further
14	observations from the Committee?
15	(No verbal response.)
16	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Hearing none, all those in
17	favor?
18	(WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
19	with "aye.")
20	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?
21	This resolution also carries.
22	MS. KOBRINSKI: Can we have a motion for
23	reconsider of 2022-A?
24	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: The motion for
25	reconsideration of 2022-A is on the table.

1	MR. DIAZ-HERMAN: Diaz-Herman.
2	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: I have a first.
3	MS. DONWROTH: Second, Donworth.
4	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second. All those in
5	favor?
6	(WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
7	with "aye.")
8	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Any opposed?
9	(No verbal response.)
10	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Leigh, do I simply reread the
11	resolution?
12	MS. KOBRINSKI: Right, you can have a motion to
13	approve it and then call for the recusal and Ms.
14	Neasman can recuse.
15	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you.
16	May I have a motion to approve Resolution 2022-A?
17	MS. DONWORTH: Donworth.
18	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second?
19	MS. WELLER: Second, Weller.
20	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And moving to recusals.
21	MS. NEASMAN: Recused, Neasman.
22	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you.
23	Discussion?
24	(No verbal response.)
25	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Hearing none, all those in

1	favor?
2	(WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
3	with "aye.")
4	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Any opposed?
5	(No verbal response.)
6	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Resolution 2022-A carries.
7	Let's move now to Resolution 2022-B. May we have
8	a motion to amend this resolution?
9	MS. KOBRINSKI: To reconsider.
10	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: To reconsider this
11	resolution.
12	MS. DONWORTH: Donworth.
13	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Donworth, one. And a second,
14	please?
15	MS. GIMENEZ: Second, Gimenez.
16	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Recusals?
17	MS. KOBRINSKI: A vote on a motion to reconsider.
18	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: That's what we're doing now,
19	correct?
20	MS. KOBRINSKI: Right, so you don't need a
21	recusal on a motion for reconsideration.
22	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Got it. Then, I retract
23	that, so we'll go straight to a vote for a
24	reconsideration motion.
25	All those in favor?

1	(WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
2	with "aye.")
3	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?
4	(No verbal response.)
5	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: The motion for
6	reconsideration carries. May we now have a motion to
7	approve Resolution 2022-B?
8	MS. DONWORTH: So moved, Donworth.
9	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. And a second?
10	MS. WELLER: Second, Weller.
11	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. And recusals?
12	MS. NEASMAN: Recusal, Neasman.
13	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Ms. Neasman.
14	All those in favor?
15	(WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
16	with "aye.")
17	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?
18	(No verbal response.)
19	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Resolution 2022-B carries.
20	Resolution 2022-C: Authorization to execute
21	contract amendments with 13 programs identified
22	herein, to increase funding for their Youth
23	Development contracts in a one-time total additional
24	amount not to exceed \$270,076.00, due to the programs
25	incurring additional programmatic implementation

1	expenses as a result of the ongoing effects of the
2	COVID-19 pandemic.
3	May I have a motion, please?
4	DR. ABRAHAM: Abraham.
5	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Second?
6	MS. DONWORTH: Second, Donworth.
7	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Are there any
8	recusals?
9	(No verbal response.)
10	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Hearing none, the floor is
11	open for discussion, observations from the Committee.
12	And hearing none, all those in favor?
13	(WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded
14	with "aye.")
15	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?
16	Resolution 2022-C carries.
17	Resolution 2022-D: Authorization to negotiate and
18	execute a contract renewal with Florida International
19	University Board of Trustees (FIU) for reading
20	enhancement services, in a total amount not to exceed
21	\$882,168.00, for a term of 12 months, commencing
22	October 1, 2022, and ending September 30, 2023, with
23	one remaining 12-month renewal, subject to annual
24	funding appropriations.
25	May I have a motion, please?

1	MS. GIMENEZ: Gimenez.
2	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. And a second?
3	MS. WELLER: Second, Weller.
4	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any recusals?
5	(No verbal response.)
6	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Moving to discussion.
7	MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: Shouldn't be too much, but I
8	know in the past when we've discussed reading
9	enhancements, and I know this is in English, so I know
10	I brought up before. I know we have many children in
11	our community that their native language is Spanish
12	and there are a few others, but just wondering if
13	there has been any thought to the reading enhancements
14	in native language, which again, I'll just repeat
15	this, that as children are learning English, the
16	research is clear, if you teach them to become
17	literate in their native tongue, then its easier to
18	learn English. So I just want to ask that and always
19	advocate. Definitely is great, but just thinking
20	about those children, you know, as they learn to read
21	in English and learn to write. Some of those
22	children, they may speak their native language or keep
23	that, but don't become literate. And that's a concern
24	for me.
25	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Tiombe.

1 MR. HAJ: Lori, can you chime in on that or 2 Rachel? 3 MS. HANSON: That's not something we can consider 4 in our refunding cycle. Thinking about specialty 5 areas right now, people have specialties in arts or 6 other kinds of college prep, things like that, maybe 7 another language can be an enhancement, like a 8 specialized program. If that's something that the 9 program wanted to offer. That's a possibility. And 10 in the summer programs, it's probably, you know. It's 11 a good opportunity because you have a full day to work 12 with as opposed to an afterschool program, where 13 really for that to happen during the school year, you 14 need a school day program, like many of the bilingual 15 programs the district offers. 16 MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: I know that our local school 17 district does offer bilingual programs in a number of 18 languages, but of course many children who are 19 experiencing marginalization, they -- especially from 20 the economic standpoint, they're usually not part of 21 those programs and I deal with a lot of programs every 22 single day from -- regardless what their income is, 23 but there definitely is a lack with certain kids that, 24 you know, they're not literate in their native 25 language. I just think that is something that should

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     be addressed across the board. I know just not all
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     The Children's Trust, but there hopefully could be a
3
     piece for The Children's Trust to advocate for that
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     and maybe present some opportunities for children that
5
     otherwise, where they don't have the parents that can
6
     provide the private tutoring for the languages or they
7
     have access, right. So that is the concern, because
8
     if you're going to learn English, which is wonderful
9
     and great, but you should not have to lose your native
10
      language, right.

2	execute a contract with Florida Introduces Physical
3	Activity and Nutrition to Youth (FLIPANY) for after-
4	school snacks and meals, in a total amount not to
5	exceed \$600,000.00, for a term of 12 months,
6	commencing October 1, 2022, and ending September 30,
7	2023, with three remaining contract renewals. And I
8	will add that this resolution is as a result of a
9	recent solicitation.
10	May I have a motion, please?
11	MS. WELLER: Weller.
12	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. And a second?
13	MS. NEASMAN: Second, Neasman.
14	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Are there any
15	recusals?
16	(No verbal response.)
17	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Hearing none, let's move to
18	discussion, observations.
19	Hearing none, all those in favor?
20	(No verbal response.)
21	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?
22	(No verbal response.)
23	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: This resolution carries. And
24	with that, I will punt it to Jim for our CEO report.
25	MR. HAJ: Madam Chair, thank you. I just have

1	two items. Young Talent, Big Dreams, the final is on
2	May 14 at the Miracle Theatre. This is the largest
3	talent show in the county. We have phenomenal talent
4	with our students and our children in this community.
5	So when you get down to this level for the finals,
6	it's really an amazing experience. We will send you
7	an invite if we haven't sent you an invite. So make
8	sure our Board Members RSVP, we'll make sure we have a
9	seat available to you. And Champions for Children is
10	an exciting time. We haven't been back in-person in
11	years. We're gearing up for May 24. Those invites
12	are on your calendars. We hope that the entire Board
13	is there as we recognize leaders in this community and
14	our programs of the year and we celebrate the unsung
15	heroes in this community on May 24.
16	Thank you, Madam Chair.
17	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Jim.
18	And with that, Committee Members, we are
19	adjourned. Thank you for your time today.
